

ACADEMIC LIFE AT UWC






Our world is dealing with urgent issues: from climate breakdown to social injustice, global conflict and more. With a unique focus on peace and sustainability, our different approach to learning curricula help young people to develop the skills that are needed to face the challenges of our time.

Most 16-19 year olds students at UWC schools study the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (IBDP), a globally recognised, multidisciplinary, two-year programme offered at all UWC schools.

Alongside the IBDP, some UWC schools also offer the International Baccalaureate Career-related Programme (IBCP), which follows an equally rigorous curriculum that offers an opportunity to specialise in a particular field, such as music or sustainability.

IBDP CORE COMPONENTS


- Theory of knowledge: the objective is to reflect on the nature of knowledge and on how we know what we claim to know. This component is assessed through a 1,600 word essay and oral presentation.
- Extended essay: this is an independent, self-directed piece of research, usually focusing on a topic from one of six subject groups, which produces a 4,000word essay.
- Creativity, activity, service (CAS): this is an opportunity to develop your
 creative thinking and skills, participate in physical exercise, sport and outdoor
 learning, and engage in service learning such as volunteering in the local
 community.

IBDP SUBJECT GROUPS


IBDP students choose one course from each of the following subject areas:

- Studies in language and literature
- Language acquisition
- Individuals and societies
- Sciences
- Mathematics
- The Arts


Students generally study three subjects at standard level and three at a higher level, which means they are expected to demonstrate a higher level of knowledge, understanding and skills.





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The IBCP, like the IBDP, is a rigorous education programme and is also highly respected by universities worldwide.

What makes the IBCP different is that it offers students the opportunity to specialise in a specific field. So if you know that you want to pursue a particular career path or gain hands-on experience in a particular area, the IBCP could be the right pathway for you.

IBCP COMPONENTS

- IBCP students take a minimum of two IBDP courses, chosen from the following six subject areas: studies in language and literature; language acquisition; individuals and societies; sciences; mathematics; and the arts.
- The IBCP core creates a bridge between students' chosen IBDP courses and their career-related study, and includes four components: personal and professional skills; service learning; language development; and a reflective project.

The career-related study complements the programme's academic rigour, providing a practical and real-world approach to learning. The focus is on preparing students for higher education, internships, apprenticeships or employment. Each school creates its own distinctive version of the curriculum based on its local area, environment and context.

WHICH UWC SCHOOLS OFFER THE IBCP?

The following UWC schools offer the IBCP alongside the IBDP:

- Pearson College UWC has developed a unique two-year Climate Action Leadership Diploma
 (CALD) for students with a passion for addressing climate change and environmental stewardship.
 Alongside taking two or three IBDP courses, CALD students embark on climate action leadership studies developed in conjunction with regional universities. The programme incorporates local indigenous knowledge and environmental stewardship as well as bespoke climate-focused education and field school.
- **UWC Maastricht** has designed a Business and Sustainability curriculum in partnership with the Sustainable Management School (SUMAS) in Switzerland, including topics such as hospitality, the fashion industry and sustainable leadership. Students take two to four IBDP subjects of choice. UWC Maastricht also offers a Music programme for talented musicians aspiring to a career or further studies in this field. Students are able to audition for a place on the Junior Classical or Jazz programmes with UWC Maastricht's educational partner, the Conservatorium Maastricht. Students will share weekly lessons with the Conservatorium and are regularly involved with workshops, masterclasses, rehearsals and performances.









CONTINUOUS EDUCATIONAL INNOVATION

Since the founding of our first UWC school in 1962, we have established ourselves as educational innovators.

We played a key role in the creation of the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (IBDP), and we continue to collaborate with the IB to craft bespoke educational pathways.



In 2023, we launched the <u>Systems</u> **Transformation** Pathway: **Leadership For** Just Futures at **UWC Atlantic. This** is a bespoke curriculum designed to equip students with the skills, attitude and abilities they need to tackle complex and interdependent challenges in the areas of Biodiversity, Energy, Food or Migration. UWC South East Asia is also working with the IB to launch a similar pathway starting September 2024.
